Archivist since 1997 during which period she has been actively involved in cataloguing and depositing material at the M.B.S. Malcolm Norris Research Centre at Birmingham University.

Robert Oakley has been a member of the Society since 1962. He has served as Hon. Auditor and subsequently Independent Examiner since 1970 representing an exceptional record of service and dedication.

Trustees' report

The Trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 31st December 2011. The Trustees who served during the year and up to the date of this report are set out on page 1.

Structure, governance and management

The Society was founded in 1887 as the Cambridge University Association of Brass Collectors and renamed as the Monumental Brass Society on 1st January 1894. The Society went into abeyance from 1st December 1914 until its revival on 6th February 1934. It is governed by a Trust Deed dated 1st April 1967 and was registered with the Charity Commission on 27th November 1967. H.M. Revenue & Customs has accepted the Society as a Charity within the definition of section 506(1) of the Income and Corporation Taxes Act 1988, as a result of which the Society's income and gains are not taxable to the extent that they are applicable and applied to charitable purposes.

The affairs of the Society are managed by an Executive Council ("the Trustees") of which all the officers (President, Vice-Presidents, Hon. Secretary, Hon. Treasurer, Hon. Editor) are members in addition to six ordinary members. The latter serve for a period of three years with two such members retiring by rotation each year. No person retiring is eligible for re-election at the same meeting. Nominations to fill vacancies on the Executive Council, duly proposed and seconded by two members of the Society and indicating the willingness of the nominee to stand must reach the Hon. Secretary by not later than 7th June each year. The officers of the Society and members of the Executive Council are elected at the Annual General Meeting. The Trustees have the power to fill vacancies occurring amongst the officers till the next Annual General Meeting and to co-opt such additional members as in their judgement are necessary.

The Trustees normally meet three times each year to consider grant applications and to conduct the business of the Charity.

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the Society is exposed and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

Objectives and activities

The Society's objects are:

- (a) To endeavour to ensure the better preservation of monumental brasses, indents of lost brasses and incised slabs;
- (b) To promote the study of, and interest in, monumental brasses, indents and incised slabs by the publication of transactions and in any other way possible; and
- (c) To compile with a view to publication a list of all extant brasses, indents and incised slabs, both British and foreign.

The Trustees have paid due regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the Society should undertake.

Achievements and performance

Members

During the period under review 23 (2010/11: 7) new members were elected and, after taking into account deaths, resignations and lapsed members, the membership stood, as at the date of this report, at 392 (2010/11: 393). The total comprised 4 (2010/11: 4) Honorary members; 339 (2010/11: 340) Ordinary members; 8 (2010/11: 8) Family members; 6 (2010/11: 4) Associate members and 35 (2010/11: 37) Institutional members.

Personalia

The period under review saw the passing of six members: Runnalls Davies (2007), Richard Denyer (2005), Ray Elliott (1973), Tony Voice (1996), Professor Sir Frederick Warner (1953) and Simon Walton (1971).

Meetings

Three General Meetings of the Society were held.

The first was held at the Royal Foundation of St. Katharine on 8th October 2011 where our member, Susan Macklin (grand-daughter of Rev. Herbert Macklin, President of the Society from 1903-14) spoke on Chalchotriptic Expeditions: The Life and Diary of H.W. Macklin.

The second was held by special arrangement at the Sir John Soane Museum on 14th January 2012. Following a welcome by the President an introductory talk was given by Jerzy Kierkuc-Bielinski, Exhibitions Curator. William Lack proceeded to reveal that the brass, comprising a group of sons (dated c.1520) in the possession of the Museum, originated from Wimpole, Cambridgeshire and was probably acquired by Soane when working on the adjacent Hall in 1791-3. Our members, Stephen Freeth and Sophie Oosterwijk also spoke on *Brasses in Museums* and *Children on Brasses and Monuments* respectively.

The third General meeting was held by special arrangement at South Mimms church on 31st March 2012. Following a welcome by the President our member Jessica Freeman spoke on *The Frowyk Family of Middlesex and London*. Nick Holder, Jon Bayliss and Derrick Chivers also spoke on *Henry Frowyk's Foundation Stone at the Guildhall Chapel, London; Commemoration of the Frowyks at South Mimms*; and *The Brasses of South Mimms* respectively.

The Annual General Meeting was held in the redundant church dedicated to All Saints at East Horndon, Essex, on 23rd July 2011. Following the formal business our members, Chris Starr, Rachel Canty and David Lillistone spoke on *The fight to save All Saints and the loss of the Tyrell family Brasses; The Incised Slab commemorating Lady Alice Tyrell, 1422*; and *The Indent and Brass commemorating the Tyrells of Gipping at Stowmarket, Suffolk* respectively.

Conference

A Conference was held from 2nd to 4th September 2011 at Manchester. After dinner and a welcome by the President, An Introduction to Manchester and South Lancashire was provided by Matthew Hyde (joint-author of Lancashire: Manchester and the South-East and Cheshire, part of the Pevsner Architectural Guides: Buildings of England series).

On the Saturday an excursion was organised and led by our members, Patrick Farman and Peter Hacker. The morning session was occupied with a visit to Wilmslow church and Manchester Cathedral. After lunch the churches at Rochdale and Middleton were visited. A sherry reception and the Conference Dinner took place in the evening.

On the Sunday morning our member, Jon Bayliss spoke on *The Brass of Major-General Ralph Assheton* in a wide monumental context. Our member, Jonathan Ali also spoke on *Lancashire a late blooming* county for monumental brasses. After coffee, our member, Jonathan Moor spoke on "With apologies to M.R. James": the story of a disappearance and a reappearance. Jerome Bertram concluded the session with "False Ancestors": Inscriptions on brasses purporting to be earlier than the date of engraving. After lunch Penny Hebgin-Barnes spoke on "If my name be set in the window": early memorial glazing in Cheshire and Lancashire. The Members' Forum which followed enabled members to contribute.

Publications

The period under review produced two further issues of the *Transactions* for the years 2010 and 2011 (Volume XVIII, Parts 2 and 3) under the editorship of Nicholas Rogers.

The Hon. Bulletin Editor, William Lack, was responsible for three issues of the *Bulletin* (118, 119 and 120).

Conservation

In the matter of conservation of brasses the Society has made the following grants:

Essex, Bocking: £125 towards the conservation of two monumental brasses (LSW.XII and XV);

Essex, Laindon: £150.00 towards the conservation of two monumental brasses (LSW.I and II);

Kent, Luddesdowne: £200 towards the conservation of the monumental brass commemorating a man in armour, engraved c.1450, (M.S.I.); and

Norfolk, Tibbenham: £200.00 towards the conservation of three monumental brasses (M.S.I, II and II);

Sussex, Claydon: £250.00 towards the conservation of the monumental brass commemorating Richard Idon, 1523, (M.S.II.); and

Wiltshire, Tilshead: £75 towards the conservation of the monumental brass commemorating John Parham 1875, aged 81; also son, George Parham, 1870, aged 51; and Foundation of John Parham's Charity; and

Yorkshire (W.R.), Ripon: £125.00 towards the conservation of the monumental brass commemorating [Robert Dawson, 1603], (M.S.I.).

The Society also granted the sum of £1,000.00 towards the costs of an investigation into the technical and analytical background to monumental brasses which will be undertaken at the Research Laboratory for Archaeology and the History of Art at the University of Oxford.

Financial review

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the Charities Act 2011 and the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005. It is the policy of the Society that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent to between three and six months' expenditure. The Trustees consider that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the Society's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised.

This level of reserves has been maintained throughout the year.

They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

1. Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention modified to include the revaluation of certain fixed assets.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005 and the Charities Act 2011.

1.2 Incoming resources

Donations, legacies and other forms of voluntary income are recognised as incoming resources when receivable, except insofar as they are incapable of financial measurement.

Grants are recognised as incoming resources when receivable.

Membership subscriptions are recognised as incoming resources when received.

1.3 Resources expended

These are recognised in the period in which they are incurred. Resources expended include VAT which cannot be recovered. Governance comprises costs for the running of the charity itself as an organisation.

1.4 Investments

Current asset investments are stated at market value.

1.5 Foreign currency translation

Transactions denominated in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate ruling at the date of the transaction.

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rates of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. All differences are included in net outgoing resources.

Independent examiner's report

To the Trustees of the Monumental Brass Society

I report on the accounts of the Society for the year ended 31st December 2011 which are set out on pages 8 to 14.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner
