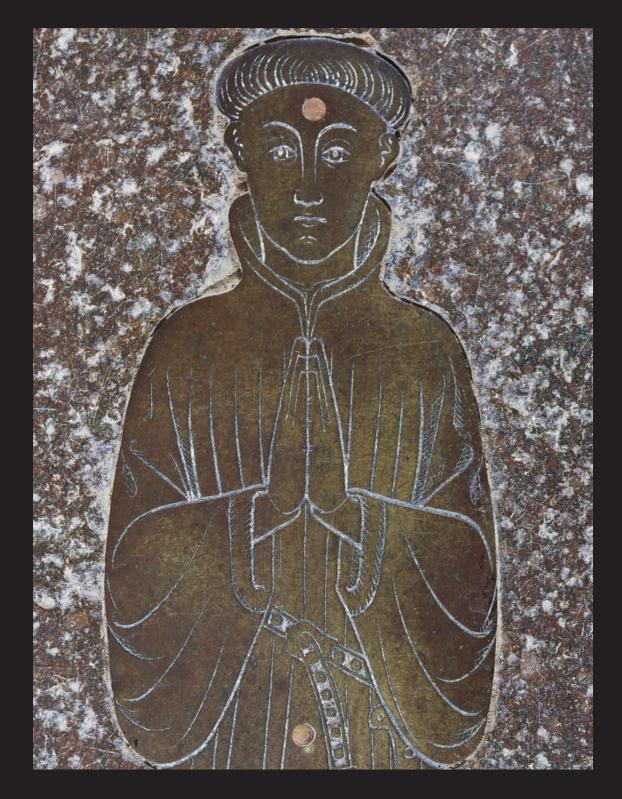

Trustees' report 2018/19

The Trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 31st December 2018. The Trustees who served during the year and up to the date of this report are set out on page 1.

Structure, governance and management

The Society was founded in 1887 as the Cambridge University Association of Brass Collectors and renamed as the Monumental Brass Society on 1st January 1894. The Society went into abeyance from 1st December 1914 until its revival on 6th February 1934. It is governed by a Trust Deed dated 1st April 1967 and was registered with the Charity Commission on 27th November 1967. H.M. Revenue & Customs has accepted the Society as a Charity within the definition of section 506(1) of the Income and Corporation Taxes Act 1988, as a result of which the Society's income and gains are not taxable to the extent that they are applicable and applied to charitable purposes.

The affairs of the Society are managed by an Executive Council ("the Trustees") of which all the officers (President, Vice-Presidents, Hon. Secretary, Hon. Treasurer, Hon. Editor) are members in addition to six ordinary members. The latter serve for a period of three years with two such members retiring by rotation each year. No person retiring is eligible for re-election at the same meeting. Nominations to fill vacancies on the Executive Council, duly proposed and seconded by two members of the Society and indicating the willingness of the nominee to stand must reach the Hon. Secretary by not later than 7th June each year. The officers of the Society and members of the Executive Council are elected at the Annual General Meeting. The Trustees have the power to fill vacancies occurring amongst the officers till the next Annual General Meeting and to co-opt such additional members as in their judgement are necessary.

The Trustees normally meet three times each year to consider grant applications and to conduct the business of the Charity.

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the Society is exposed and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

Objectives and activities

The Society's objects are:

- (a) To endeavour to ensure the better preservation of monumental brasses, indents of lost brasses and incised slabs;
- (b) To promote the study of, and interest in, monumental brasses, indents and incised slabs by the publication of transactions and in any other way possible; and
- (c) To compile with a view to publication a list of all extant brasses, indents and incised slabs, both British and foreign.

The Trustees have paid due regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the Society should undertake.

General Data Protection Regulations

The General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR) took effect from 25th May 2018. GDPR applies to 'personal data' meaning any information relating to an identifiable person. It places specific legal obligations on processors of personal data. There must be a valid lawful basis in order to process personal data. The Society's lawful basis is 'legitimate interests'. This basis is most appropriate where people's data is used in ways they would reasonably expect and which have a minimal privacy impact. The Society's Privacy Notice explains 'legitimate interests' and confirms that personal information will be used only to provide members with our publications, and any other information relating to our services.

Trustees' report 2018/19

Achievements and performance

Members

During the period under review 8 (2017/18: 9) new members were elected and, after taking into account deaths, resignations and lapsed members, the membership stood, as at the date of this report, at 392 (2017/18: 392). The total comprised 5 (2017/18: 5) Honorary members; 338 (2017/18: 337) Ordinary members; 12 (2017/18: 11) Family members; 12 (2017/18: 10) Associate members; and 25 (2017/18: 29) Institutional members.

Personalia

The period under review saw the passing of four members: David Barrick (1963), Vernon Roper (2001), Tony Trayling (1998) and George Vane (1973).

Meetings

Two General Meetings of the Society were held.

The first was held on 27th October 2018, by special arrangement, at Tottenham church, Middlesex. Following a welcome by the President, an introductory talk was provided by John Laverick who is a Reader at the church. Our Vice-President, David Meara spoke on *William Butterfield of this Parish*. Following tea (including Tottenham cake made by Sue Whittemore and organised by Janet McQueen), our member, Philip Whittemore spoke on *Chasing shadows: the lost brasses of All Hallows*. Finally, our Vice-President, Stephen Freeth spoke on *Jeffreye Walkdine, skinner, Merchant Adventurer and member of the Muscovy Company*. The meeting, arranged in association with the Edmonton Hundred Historical Association, the Enfield Archaeological Society and The Enfield Society, was organised by the Hon. Secretary. In addition, a specially produced booklet written by Stephen Freeth, Martin Stuchfield and Philip Whittemore and lavishly illustrated with drawings of the lost brasses and photographs of the extant brasses was available free to members who attended.

The second was held on 30th March 2019, by special arrangement, at Fairford church, Gloucestershire. Prior to the meeting our member, Chris Hobson provided an optional guided tour of the churchyard. Following a welcome by the President, those present were divided into two groups and treated to a tour of the church with particular reference to the extraordinary stained glass. Chris Hobson subsequently spoke on *The Tames of Fairford, Cirencester and Rendcomb*. Following tea, our Vice-President, Jerome Bertram and member, John Lee spoke on *The Brasses in Fairford Church*. Finally, due to the enforced absence of Nicola Coldstream, our member Challe Hudson read her paper entitled *Late Medieval Merchants as Patrons of Architecture*. The meeting was organised by the Hon. Secretary.

In a departure from the norm the formal business of the Annual General Meeting was held in the morning of 14th July 2018 at Rochford church, Essex. Prior to the afternoon meeting, Roger Hill of the Rochford Hundred Historical Society provided an optional guided tour of the town with its large number of vernacular buildings. The meeting was held in association with the Essex Society for Archaeology and History, the Rochford Hundred Historical Society, the Rochford Town Team and St. Andrew's church, Rochford. Proceedings were opened with a welcome by the President followed by David Andrews who spoke on *Rochford Church and Hall: An Introduction.* Martin Stuchfield spoke on *Moving target: the chequered history of the Thomas Stapel brass* prior to tea. Finally, Matthew Hefferan spoke on *Thomas Stapel, Sergeant-at-Arms to Edward III: Household service and social mobility in 14th century England.* The meeting was organised by the President to celebrate the recent introduction of the brass to Thomas Stapel, 1371, from the nearby redundant church at Sutton.

Trustees' report 2018/19

Achievements and performance (continued)

Study Day

A Study Day was held at Cobham, Kent on 29th September 2018. Proceedings were opened with a welcome by the President followed by our Vice-President, Nigel Saul who spoke on *The Cobham Brasses: Context and Meaning*. A tour of the church to view the brasses and monuments concluding the morning session. The afternoon commenced with a talk by our member, Clive Burgess on *Cobham College in Context*. Finally, our Hon. Editor, David Lepine read the paper by our Vice-President, Jerome Bertram, entitled *The Clerical Brasses*. Tea (organised by Janet McQueen) rounded off proceedings. The day was chaired by our President and organised by David Lepine (who also acted as Registrar).

Publications

The period under review produced one further issue of the *Transactions* for 2018 (Volume XIX, Part 5) under the editorship of David Lepine.

William Lack, the Hon. Bulletin Editor, was responsible for three issues of the Bulletin (138, 139 and 140).

Website

The website continued under the management of the Hon. Internet Publicity Officer, Jon Bayliss, and can be accessed at <u>www.mbs-brasses.co.uk</u>. A new website has been designed and built and will be launched to coincide with the 2019 Annual General Meeting.

Conservation

In the matter of conservation of brasses the Society awarded the following grant:

For the financial period from 12th May to 31st December 2018:

Cambridge, St Bene't: £100 towards the conservation of the monumental brass commemorating Richard Billingford, D.D., Master of Corpus Christi College, 1432 (LSW.I).

Financial review

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the Charities Act 2011 and the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005. It is the policy of the Society that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent to between three and six months' expenditure. The Trustees consider that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the Society's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised.

This level of reserves has been maintained throughout the year.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping sufficient accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Society and enable them to ensure that the accounts comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Charity (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 and the provisions of the Trust Deed. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

1. Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention modified to include the revaluation of certain fixed assets.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005 and the Charities Act 2011.

1.2 Incoming resources

Donations, legacies and other forms of voluntary income are recognised as incoming resources when receivable, except insofar as they are incapable of financial measurement.

Grants are recognised as incoming resources when receivable.

Membership subscriptions are recognised as incoming resources when received.

1.3 Resources expended

These are recognised in the period in which they are incurred. Resources expended include V.A.T. which cannot be recovered. Governance comprises costs for the running of the charity itself as an organisation.

1.4 Investments

Current asset investments are stated at market value.

1.5 Foreign currency translation

Transactions denominated in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate ruling at the date of the transaction.

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rates of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. All differences are included in net outgoing resources.

Independent examiner's report

To the Trustees of the Monumental Brass Society

I report on the accounts of the Society for the year ended 31st December 2018 which are set out on pages 8 to 15.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The Charity's Trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The Charity's Trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act) and that an independent examination is needed.

It is my responsibility to:

- examine the accounts under section 145 of the 2011 Act;
- to follow the procedures laid down in the general Directions given by the Charity Commission under section 145(5)(b) of the 2011 Act; and
- to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiner's report

My examination was carried out in accordance with the General Directions given by the Charity Commission. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the Charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeking explanations from you as Trustees concerning any such matters.
